### THE CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

Every day I'm reminded of the importance of PALS.

Fast-food bags, beer cans and water bottles litter the ditches on my daily commute. The scenery along 21 miles of county roads and city streets is marred by dirty white paper, dented silver aluminum and crumpled brown paper.

It's always bad in winter — when the dying grass and bare trees reveal the laziness of passersby. Since COVID, it seems worse.

Reduced indoor dining and increased carryout orders are part of the problem. People eat while driving and don't want to leave uneaten food and soiled wrappers in their cars. So, they toss their trash — not in a can but out the window.

The labor shortage may also be to blame. Counties, municipalities and sanitation companies have trouble finding and keeping workers. The result: overflowing garbage cans and no one — except PALS volunteers — to clean the medians and roadways.

Meanwhile, thriving sectors of the economy also increase litter. Waste and debris overflow from trucks and construction sites. Cardboard boxes from mail-order deliveries clog dumpsters and spill onto the land.

Then there's the pandemic itself. Sickness and social distancing have hampered the work of some PALS groups. Sadly, we've also lost loyal members of the PALS family to the disease.

Underlying all these issues, however, is COVID's toll on emotional health. Anxiety and pessimism plague society. We are facing another pandemic — one of hopelessness.

People are tired. They're tired of the disease, of economic uncertainty, of social unrest and of political tension.

I believe one symptom of this national malaise is litter. When folks are tired, angry and depressed, appearance doesn't matter as much — not personally, and not environmentally.

Adding one more piece of trash to an already littered roadside is like wearing a wrinkled shirt and worn-out sweatpants to the grocery store — it doesn't seem to matter.

All these factors make the work of Alabama PALS more vital than ever. As we dig out from the effects of COVID, our organization faces a huge task.

Yes, it often falls on us to clean up the mess left by others. But more importantly, we have an opportunity to help rekindle feelings of accomplishment, hope and community for our neighbors.

Nothing heals the heart quite like service — especially when the results are visible. Few things unite people like working together. And, seeing nature refreshed following a cleanup can help restore optimism for both volunteers and potential litterers.

As we begin a new year — take heart! You are important. The work of Alabama PALS is important.

Don't be discouraged by the size of the task! You never know who will be inspired by your simple act of service.

Arcadia Elementary School in Tuscaloosa County is new to the Clean Campus Program this year! This fall, I had the opportunity to meet with the school's after-school program and speak to them about littering in our state and their community. Students from ages k-4 up to fifth grade came to the presentations, and they had a lot of positive feedback on how they could make a difference!

In our talks, I encouraged the students of Arcadia Elementary to make one small decision each day that can have lasting impacts. Switching to a reusable bottle instead of one-time-use plastic bottles would make a huge impact if large numbers of students made that choice. Picking up one piece of litter every day would add up to thousands of pieces of litter if the students all made that choice. It really does make a huge impact when the children begin to realize we are all in this together!

Tuscaloosa County has wonderful resources for recycling and litter control, so I encouraged them to get involved in community initiatives that are already in place. In April, every county in the state receives bags from Alabama PALS for the annual "Don't Drop it on Alabama" spring cleanup to allocate to any town, community or neighborhood conducting a cleanup. PALS also provides bags to all schools that are members of the Clean Campus Program for campus cleanups. Be sure to check with your local County Commissioner if you are interested in receiving bags for your school or community to have a cleanup.

We are excited to see how the students of Arcadia Elementary develop into lifelong stewards of our environment! ### JOINS THE CLEAN CAMPUS PROGRAM

Students in Chambers County were able to hear our anti-litter message just in time for the spring "Don't Drop it on Alabama" Cleanup.

In December 2021, I was contacted by Chambers County Commissioner Sam Bradford regarding a new countywide anti-litter initiative. I attended a meeting soon thereafter with several leaders from the community, including School Superintendent Casey Chambley. Mr. Chambley was fully onboard with this initiative and made it a priority to have the Clean Campus Program presented to every school in the county.

Over a two-week period in February, I visited all 11 schools and presented the presentation multiple times at some locations. Thanks to the leadership of Chambers County, thousands of students were able to hear our anti-litter message just in time for the spring "Don't Drop it on Alabama" Cleanup! All schools made a commitment to have at least one campus cleanup, and Alabama PALS provided bags and grabbers to the county to help the schools with their efforts. I also communicated with the two local private schools so that they could work the Clean Campus Program into their spring curriculum, as well.

In addition to the presentations, Chambers County had posters made to display at the schools with the tag line, "Be a Part of the Solution, Not the Pollution!" These posters helped reinforce the message that was delivered earlier in the semester. The county also has been promoting the Adopt-A-Mile program as a part of their anti-litter initiative, so we are looking forward to having several new miles adopted there in 2022!

It is always a pleasure to see leadership come together in a county to tackle a problem and work in unison to find a solution. # **■ Farmers Lead On Litter Control**

Mindblown plastic bags, sauce-laden Styrofoam and discarded drink bottles mar the landscape along Alabama roads. Litter – made worse by COVID-fueled carryout orders – is more than an eyesore for Alabama farmers. It's a pricey problem.

"When folks dump stuff on your land, you've got to clean it up," said Macon County farmer Harry Noble, who serves on the board of Alabama PALS (People Against a Littered State) with his wife, Joy. "When a Bush Hog runs over litter, it makes a thousand pieces instead of just a few. There could be a tire or something in there, and it will tear up equipment. Plastic can wrap around shafts, burn bearings and damage

Litter's impact on farmers, forest landowners and rural families led to PALS' creation in 1987 by then-State Forester Bill Moody. Archives discovered during the Alabama Farmers Federation's centennial celebration last year, however, showed the organization's fight against illegal dumping began decades earlier.

"Back when we started, illegal dumping was a huge problem, whether it was on a private landowner's property or at a state park," said PALS **Executive Vice President Spencer** Ryan. "We worked with the Alabama Farmers Federation, the governor's office and the Legislature to pass bills so law enforcement can use prima facie evidence for prosecution. It really helped us clean up the illegal dump situation in Alabama."

Prima facie, meaning "on first impression," allows names, addresses and other identifying information found in litter to be used as evidence.

While enforcing litter laws is important, Joy said community involvement and education have made the most difference.

"A lot of farmers and forest landowners get involved with organizations like PALS to try to raise awareness," she said. "We start in elementary schools so young children really learn how wrong it is to litter."

The Federation and Alabama Farmers Cooperative co-sponsor PALS' Clean Campus program, which engages students in anti-littering and recycling

activities. Ryan said over half of Clean Campus schools are rural. In addition, almost 900 miles of roads are part of the Adopt-A-Mile program. In April, PALS sponsored the Don't Drop It On Alabama Spring Cleanup and will hold its 35th Coastal Cleanup in September.

"When we started, I think we had four counties involved in our first cleanup," Ryan recalled. "Because of the Farmers Federation and other sponsors, we now have a statewide program. It's overwhelming to think about how far we've come."

The Nobles have seen how a few committed volunteers can transform a community. Over 30 years ago, Joy printed flyers inviting neighbors to meet one Saturday to clean up a strip of Highway 80. About two dozen people showed up. Soon, Harry was using farm equipment to help volunteers fill up to 10 roll-off dumpsters during Macon County's recurring third Saturday

"One thing I've noticed is the cleaner the place, the cleaner it stays," Joy said. "The more trash you find in an area, the more trash is going to be there. When people tell me, 'I can't clean up where I live because they're just going to bring it back,' I tell them my experience has been once you clean it up, people don't litter as badly."

The Nobles said farmers and rural residents can help fight litter by getting involved in a local PALS chapter and being careful about their own trash especially bags and boxes, which can fly out of truck beds when unsecured.

"Take pride in the land," Harry said. "It's a reflection on the kind of farming operation you run."

Joy said landowners and concerned citizens shouldn't accept litter as inevitable.

"Don't get discouraged," she said. "Keep working to keep it clean. Eventually, people are going to pay attention; they're going to be concerned about the Earth. You can see farmers are good stewards. Where we live is beautiful."





### **MOBILE COUNTY**



Mobile County Environmental Enforcement held 3 community "Operation Clean Sweep" events from March 5, through April 23, 2022. 811 acceptable loads of junk and rubbish were collected to include 94,686 pounds of scrap metal, 17,723 pounds electronics and 622 tires collected for recycling in an effort to keep Mobile County beautiful.



On Saturday, September 17, 2022, thousands of volunteers will head towards the beaches, lakes, and streams of Alabama to remove trash and debris on land and under the water. Volunteers of all ages will form the largest one-day volunteer event in the state on behalf of clean oceans and waterways — Alabama's Coastal Cleanup.

During last year's cleanup, many dedicated volunteers braved rainy weather and were able remove 26,336 pounds of debris. We are proud of our volunteers and look forward to a successful 2022 cleanup!

#### Pollution prevention is the key

Alabama's Coastal Cleanup isn't just about pollution cleanup — it's also about pollution prevention. The event focuses on educating and empowering people to become a part of the marine debris solution.

What makes the Alabama Coastal Cleanup unique is its data collection component. Volunteers record specific types of marine debris being found, allowing Ocean Con sponsor of the International Coastal Cleanup, to compile, analyze and track this data year-by-year and make discoveries about the behaviors that cause the debris.

The final information is used to educate the public, busine industry, and government officials about the problem. We believe understanding the problem is the key to finding longlasting solutions.
